Directions: Edit the following references based on the information outlined in section 3.15 of the *AMA Manual of Style*. Access the URLs to determine the type of material that is being cited. According to the *AMA Manual of Style*, "In citing data from a website, include the following elements, if available, in the order shown: Author(s), if given (often, no authors are given). Title of the specific item cited (if none is given, use the name of the organization responsible for the site). Name of the website. URL [provide URL and verify that the link still works as close as possible to publication]. Published [date]. Updated [date]. Accessed [date]." However, it is often difficult to discern authors from publishers and books or reports from journal-type articles. Below are some examples of references for web material with suggestions of how to cite them, extrapolating from the information in the *AMA Manual of Style*.
